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"ENROLLING AND RETAINING UNDERREPRESENTED MINORITY POPULATIONS IN STEM"



Although there has been extensive research on STEM and underrepresented populations, including studies related to underrepresented minorities' (URM) barriers to STEM and practices to increase the visibility of URMs in STEM, additional research and data reveal the impact of social and cultural barriers that contribute to explicit racial and gender gaps in STEM fields.

Understanding the history of the development of barriers and education for minorities is an integral part of understanding key factors such as the attitudes, perceptions, and priorities of underrepresented minorities in the present time. Therefore, this presentation will cover (A) the impact of race, gender, and education on STEM; (B) the impact of belief systems on STEM career aspirations; and (C) strategies to mitigate the barriers.
